From the Pastor's Study...

"Yes, but who are your people?"

As a missionary in Kazakhstan I knew from the tone of the conversation, that while I understood the Russian language being spoken, I was missing the question being asked. "My people???" "What she is asking is, who are your people—what nationality is your family? Yes, you are an American, but *who* are you?" My friend translated. "OH! I'm German on my mother's side and Swedish on my Father's!" I replied.

Knowing where we come from often helps us to understand where we are going. As Christians the world asks us, "Who are you?" But the question should be phrased, "*Whose* are you?"

Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians writes, "In love [God] predestined us for adoption to son ship through Jesus Christ, in accordance with is pleasure and will—to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves." (Ephesians 1:5-6) And we read this and those who profess themselves as Christians get excited—as we should—God has adopted us.

But the problem that many of us face is that we forget *why* God adopted us. Yes, it was because he loved us, but it was also because he had a job for us to do. In the Roman legal system a son was adopted so that the adoptive Father's legacy might continue on; not the sole benefit of the child. Paul states that we were adopted according to God's pleasure and will, which is "to the praise of his glorious grace" which he has given freely to us.

Jesus, in his last command to the disciples lay out God's pleasure and will in what we now know as the Great Commission, Matthew 28:18-20, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." In these words of Jesus we are told that God wants his legacy to be continued through his children. In order for "the praise of his glorious grace" to be given, we need to proclaim who God is and what that grace is all about.

And that can be uncomfortable at times because it means a shift in our human thinking. Life no longer is about *me*, but about others. It means that my way of doing things will be disrupted so that God's will can be accomplished. It's difficult at times, but it's part of the adoption process.

During the transitional pastorate relationship, you will see and feel many changes. Some are going to be very comforting; others very disruptive to the current state of affairs. My prayer though is that as a family of faith at Providence we would be able to discern our will from God's and seek his kingdom first so that all who enter our doors find a place at the table of our Lord and will be able to "praise his glorious grace"!

EPC Q&A:

"What is the EPC stance on women in ministry and what's the biblical support?"

The EPC motto is: "In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty and in all things charity." The EPC holds only seven essentials.¹ This means that there are numerous "non-essential"; issues which we will debate but we're not going to legislate into polity and doctrinal practice. Some of these subjects are: charismatic gifts, infant baptism, and women's ordination as Ruling and Teaching Elders. The reason for this is because "neither position is essential to the existence of the church. Since people of good faith who equally love the Lord and hold to the infallibility of Scripture differ on this issue, and since uniformity of view and practice is not essential to the existence of the visible church, the Evangelical Presbyterian Church has chosen to leave this decision to the Spirit-guided consciences of particular congregations concerning the ordination of women as elders and deacons, and to the presbyteries concerning the ordination of women as ministers."¹

The best way to understand the biblical support for the EPC stance on the ordination of women is to look at Paul's understanding of the role of women in church leadership. Throughout the Old Testament God raised up women leaders like Miriam and Deborah to lead his people, but most people turn to Paul when it comes to Christian women and leadership.

The most famous scripture used against the ordination of women is 1 Corinthians 14: 34-35 "Women should remain silent in the church. They are not allowed to speak, but must be in submission, as the law says. If they want to inquire about something, they should ask their own husbands at home; for it is disgraceful for a woman to speak in the church." Taken alone, it seems very clear that Paul does not allow women to speak, let alone hold an office, in the church. However, we need to put these verses back into the proper context. 1 Corinthians was a letter which "revolves around the theme of problems in the church with respect to Christian conduct."¹ Paul's writing still stands today for the edification for all generations but we cannot proof text one scripture to fit our agenda. When we read 1 Corinthians 14:34-35, we see that Paul is not arguing against women in ministry, but rather women who would disrupt the teachings of the apostles. In chapter 14 Paul is writing about good order in worship, including to holding questions and comments about the teachings until after service. The women of Corinth had a problem controlling themselves and needed to be put in their place.

Paul however was very progressive when it came to women in the church. In Romans 16 he lists at least nine women who he considered, "women who work hard in the Lord." The most significant was Phoebe (vs.1-2) who was a deacon in Cenchreae and was probably the one who carried the letter to the Romans. Now, this doesn't mean she was just a postal worker. In Roman culture messengers were given letters to deliver, expected to read them and be able to answer any questions regarding the message. The modern day equivalent of this is the preacher who reads the word of God and is able to proclaim its message to the people in the sermon. Phoebe was a deacon and a preacher.

In Acts 2:17-21 Peter quotes the prophet Joel who foretold of the Holy Spirit coming upon all believers including women. And so, when we talk about the ordination of women (or men) we need to check our personal opinions against the spiritual evidence in that person's life: Is s/he living a life of faithfulness to the gospel of Jesus Christ?

Does s/he submit to the authority of the church? Does s/he have the gifting necessary to be a spiritual as well as administrative leader in the church? Does s/he embody the spirit of the law found in 1 Timothy regarding the role of elders and deacons? Because at the end of the day, "The Lord does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart." (1 Samuel 16:7)

Highlight ofiMiseof StedeSsion Meeting February 10, 2020

Pastor Nadia addressed a report from a member regarding Rev. Jim Davis having accepted a call to a church in South Carolina. A motion was approved to allow Rev. Davis until Monday, February 17, to officially inform Providence regarding the terms of his new call as required by the Dissolution Agreement. [Update: Rev. Davis contacted Sam Stephenson on February 11, 2020 to inform Providence that he will begin a new call on April 1, 2020.]

Open and Actionable Items

Presentation by Grimes Land Services - Session heard a proposal by Michael Grimes, representative of the McGee's Crossroads Water District (WD). The WD plans an expansion of its infrastructure to better serve its customers. The WD requests the purchase a permanent easement on the corner of Old Stage and Highway 210 (approximately 16' by 66'). The WD asks for a second temporary easement to stage equipment during the project. The WD offered \$5,975.00 to purchase the permanent easement. The project's start and end dates are not known. The WD agrees to restore Providence property to its original condition. Providence will retain ownership of the property. Session approved a motion to allow the purchase of the easement and to apply the full amount to the principle of the mortgage.

Finance – Copies of the January financial report were reviewed. Funds from the sale of a stock donation were moved the Money Market Account, raising it to \$188,542.80. The funds from the sale of the stock will be used to reduce the loan principle once loan refinancing discussions are completed. Donations in January were strong, due in part to a member's yearly tithe having been received as one donation and the receipt of \$10,000 from the Johnston County Board of Elections.

Gifts totaling \$6,100 were received into the Development Fund to retire the debt owed to New Hope Presbytery. Notable figures in the January report include:

S.W.O.T. – Pastor Nadia led a review of the responses she received from Session identifying Providence's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats. After the review, Session was asked, "What is God's vision for our church?" The response was, "The Great Commission." Several thoughts were shared on how to achieve the vision. Focus was mostly on the question of how to accommodate more people during worship. Session will meet at a later date to more fully discuss the subject.

Johnston Count Board of Elections Rental Money – A motion put forward by the sub-committee was approved, giving Session jurisdiction to decide the best use for the funds. No decision was made.

New Business

Children's Christian Education – A motion was approved to use *Rocky Railway* by Group as the 2020 VBS theme and curriculum. A motion was approved to permanent cancel Children's Worship on Mother's Day and Father's Day.

Next Stated Session meeting will be held March 9, 2020 at 7pm.
